### Greetings from the Board Chair & CEO

The Board and Administration worked together diligently during the year in the completion of a fiveyear plan to lay down the path of growth in long term care, supportive living, dementia care and Adult Day Program.

Home care service is another business we have identified for future growth. These streams of business will become Wing Kei business model in the coming years.



Our 5 years plan which is explained in greater detail in this report is a road map to identify our goal in serving the seniors in Calgary.

In the execution of the five-year plan, we need to be cognizant of the everchanging environment in which we operate particularly in the following areas:

- Government funding in capital cost may not continue at a level as in the past. Given increases in construction cost, we need to be ready and responsive to market changes in project financing of new facilities.
- 2. Increase in the complexity and acuity of senior residents demands more caring hours and staff resources. Operating fund and resident fee may not correspond to the increase in care that is required. Therefore, we need to be efficient and resourceful in our operations, able to do more with less while we can ensure safe and quality care and be able to keep up with the competitiveness in staff recruitment.
- 3. As our staff demographic changes and increase preference for shorter work week, effective work scheduling and good succession plan are essential in striking a balance for work satisfaction and quality of resident care. This requires mutual understanding and respect between management and staff.

Therefore, it is important for us as a team to be versatile and innovative in the execution of the 5 years plan. The plan is a dynamic road map able to shift directions in the environment we operate similar to a sail boat looking for wind and current so that we can steer it to the destination.

On behalf of the Board, I like to express our deepest thanks to the leadership of Kathy Tam, our Chief Executive Officer and her staff in making Wing Kei a household name in senior care. Their dedication and hard work have brought many acclaims to Wing Kei.

# Planning for growth

A significant focus for Wing Kei's Board of Directors in 2016 was to create a five-year strategic plan to set the direction for the organization between now and 2020.

"Developing a strategic plan was proactive, vision-directed and action-oriented," says Judy Hanson, Wing Kei Board member. She notes that strategic planning has practical value: it provides thorough, thoughtful and deliberate planning to govern the organization and to support the Wing Kei community to work towards common purpose. Importantly, the strategic plan allows the organization to tangibly evaluate how goals are being met to achieve that common purpose.

As the Board was developing the strategic plan, they looked to others in the sector who were exploring creative ways to offer seniors services. A visit to Toronto to meet with three seniors care providers resulted in information sharing, brainstorming and tremendous learning. From looking at options for bundling seniors care services to market analysis and data sharing to opportunities for research and innovation, the conversations with colleagues was energizing and enlightening. "Our time in Toronto enabled me to think in a much broader and more holistic manner. The experience demonstrated that we should plan with an open mind and a strong look to future strategies for providing care with older adults," says Hanson.

At the heart of the strategic plan is a focus on strengthening Wing Kei, making us even more responsive and strategic. As the core of the organization is enhanced, our ambitious growth plan can come to fruition. Growing in size also means

further developing human resources, finances, programs and services, explains Philip Chang, Wing Kei Board member. Strategic planning always involves some dreaming—thinking about what the potential of the organization is—and the Board has high hopes for Wing Kei's continued evolution to meet the changing needs of seniors. What remains constant, however, is the unwavering commitment to serve seniors with compassion and love.

Wing Kei's strategic plan is a living document that guides us as we move forward to care for seniors.

## Celebrating our WOrk

Sometimes, especially in health care, terminology can be difficult to understand. We don't always know what the similarities and differences are in levels of care and what we can expect in terms of services and programs.

Wing Kei is a provider of continuing care services. Continuing care covers a broad range of services including home care, supportive living and long term care. We offer both supportive living and long term care. Wing Kei Greenview is our

primary site for supportive living services. This is for people who want to be independent and who require greater care than they can receive at home. Care is provided primarily by Health Care Aides. In contrast, long term care, which is offered at the Wing

Kei Care Centre, is for people who have complex needs and require 24/7 care. Care is provided by a combination of Health Care Aides, Licensed Practical Nurses and Registered Nurses. Both supportive living and long term care include recreational and social programming.

While the care residents require in these two streams of service is quite different, a crucial

similarity is that the underlying philosophy in all continuing care services is to maintain or enhance each person's independence.

The statistics in our province indicate that dementia care will be an ever-increasing area of program service and delivery. There are currently more than 13,000 seniors in Calgary who have a diagnosis of dementia. Within 15 years, it's predicated that over 900,000 people in Canada will be living with dementia. "Our goal is to help residents with dementia feel safe, secure and valued and live their lives with dignity," says Lily Fung, Clinical Manager. "We believe in caring for the emotions, no different than what each of us needs in daily life." With dementia care, providing culturally appropriate care is much more critical. When seniors are in surroundings that feel familiar—what they see, eat and hear-it fosters greater comfort, safety and well-being.

Wing Kei also offers an Adult Day Program for seniors who benefit from participating in a variety of activities, keeping their minds active and offering opportunities to socialize in a friendly, welcoming setting.

"We strive to set the highest standard of care," says Hong Mao, Clinical Manager. "Our teams provide quality services to our residents, supporting them to live every day with a sense of security, joy, fun, dignity and love. The comfort and health of residents is our first priority."

### 2016~2017 HIGHLIGHTS

#### **Caring for our team**

### Hearing from those we Serve

My mom Tang Suet-Ying came to Wing Kei Care Center in 2012, she is now 98 years old. Before then, she lived by herself in a seniors apartment.

She used to cook meals for our family all the time. When she advanced in her age, she became forgetful. In order to keep her safe, we unplugged the cooking appliances; but she had managed to burn the pots and pans again. It's time to move her into a nursing home. We needed someone to keep an eye on her.

Seven years ago, when we'd made the decision and applied for her to come to Wing Kei, we waited for a few months and then the good news came. There's an opening for her! We were very happy but mom had a different thought about it. Of course, we understand because she feels like she was losing her freedom, even now!


I still remember her struggles vividly, starting December 12th, 2012 when she arrived at Wing Kei. The first week had gone fast, but it was endless pleading with her to keep her calm. My mom has a reputation of standing firm and won't give up easily once she's made up her mind. Every 15 minutes or so she would ask anyone who walked by to call 911 for the police, stating that they had no right to lock her up there without her consent. This went on day and night for the entire week! I don't know how the staff did it. It must have been exhausting for them to constantly talk with her and distract her from running to the exit door. I deeply appreciate their resourcefulness, true grit, gentleness, respect, patience and kindness to my mom.

Once my mom settled down, she started to participate in recreation programs such as arts and crafts, card games, bowling, racquet-ball, making cakes, and folding baby clothes. One of the staff, Dickie, who could well remember my mom's sharing of her life stories, came to recount them to us. And how can I not mention Johanna who painted mom's finger nails for free? Mom looked pretty and was extremely happy! We feel so blessed that the staff is treating mom like their own family.

One time I received a survey to rate Wing Kei's service. So I wrote down suggestion in the space provided, asking Wing Kei to add more activities for the seniors, including weekends, because some residents were alone and have not many visitors. Later on, I saw the activities increased, they'd listened to my request!

Thank you Wing Kei! I am very grateful for your team work and professionalism; your love towards my mother is immeasurable. May you continue to have great success in your mission to provide care for our seniors!
